The regular meeting of the Wormleysburg Borough Council was held on March 13, 2018, in Council Chambers. The meeting was called to order by Council President Thomas Martini at 7:30 p.m. The Pledge of Allegiance was led by Mr. Rimby.

Also present was Mr. Berresford, Borough Manager/Secretary/Treasurer, Joel Rimby, Borough Solicitor representative and Mrs. Godfrey, Secretary.

Mr. Martini requested that all speakers and Councilpersons speak into the microphones speak clearly and speak up so everyone in the room can hear you.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

A Motion by Mr. Deklinski, second by Mrs. Stuart: to approve the Minutes of the February 13, 2018 meeting, as presented. The Motion carried.

APPROVAL OF AGENDA

The Agenda was accepted as presented.

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CITIZENS

a. Donald Carter, owner of Dukes, Rockbass Grill and Dockside Willies restaurants spoke to council about the high cost of sewer rates for business in the borough. He provided a sheet showing how much he paid in 2017 for the three restaurants. He would like the borough to once again look over its rates to determine if they are being fairly applied to businesses using high volumes of water.

BOROUGH MANAGER REPORT

a. There were no questions.

TREASURER

a. A Motion by Mr. Deklinski, Second by Ms. Stuski: to accept the Treasurer's Report for March 2018 and file for audit. The Motion carried.

SOLICITOR

a. Mr. Rimby reviewed the two Ordinances 514 and 515 which he was instrumental in writing. A Motion by Mrs. Stuart, second by Mr. Deklinski: to advertise for adoption Ordinance 514 and 515. The Motion carried.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT'S REPORT

a. Mr. Martini brought up the Volunteers Recognition for this year and noted that there has been a weak response from those invited to attend. He questioned council about canceling it. Borough council's consensus was to have it anyhow.

MAYOR'S REPORT

- a. The Mayor reviewed the February 2018 West Shore Regional Police Incident Report and there were no questions.
- b. The police department's armored car needs to be registered before use.
- c. For National Night Out in 2018, there will be a meeting with the Greek Church, where the festivities will be held, on April 9th at 5:30.

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PLANNING COMMISSION

a. Mr. Deklinski reported that there will be a meeting on April 2 to review plans for the Woods at Waterford housing project proposed for West Crestwood Drive.

JUNIOR COUNCIL PERSON REPORT

a. Ms. Vasconcelos reported that the Mini-Thon raised \$106,000.00 this year.

b. The police were called to the school due to a threat made on a school bus and the bus was evacuated. They are roaming the halls of the school. The school had a 'shooter drill' recently.

BUILDING, PROPERTY & AUXILIARY SERVICE

a. Mr. Kahler reported that he and Mr. Deklinski met with Mr. Gipe regarding the kitchen. They have garnered the assistance of some volunteer firefighters to clean the kitchen well and then look into replacing things that need replacement with auctioned items.

ADMINISTRATION COMMITTEE

a. A Motion by Mr. Hawbecker, second by Mr. Deklinski: to pay the 2 Payroll checks for 2018 totaling \$410.00. The Motion carried.

A Motion by Mr. Hawbecker, second by Ms. Stuski: to pay the 2018 General Fund bills, 30 checks totaling \$67,130.53. The Motion carried.

A Motion by Mr. Hawbecker, second by Mrs. Stuart: to pay the 2018 Sewer Revenue Fund bills, 17 checks totaling \$71,779.09. The Motion carried.

b. A Motion by Mr. Hawbecker, second by Mr. Deklinski: to name Debra Moore as the Deputy Tax Collector. The Motion carried. This is a mandated position in case the elected Tax Collector is unable to work short term.

PARKS, PUBLIC LANDS, RECREATION

a. The Recreation Board is preparing for the Easter Egg Hunt on March 24th. Members should meet at 9:00 a.m. that day and Mr. Kahler will bring the bunny suit. The basket preparation is being handled by Arreanne Redding.

Parks/Public Lands/Recreation continued.

- b. Ms. Stuski reported that at the CAPCOG meeting the opioid problems were discussed. There were 83 opioid deaths in Cumberland County last year**
- c. The County prison is pursuing a comprehensive program to prevent people from getting high on drugs once they're out of prison. There is a grant program for non-profits and municipalities for plans, ordinances and projects consistent with the County Comprehensive Plan.**
- d. The electronic recycling center from July to December 2017, 313,000 pounds of electronics were collected.**
- e. Issues regarding the Volunteer Firefighters training and the SWIFT fund are moving forward thanks to CAPCOG and Senator Luckovich who is pushing three bills.**

STREETS, HIGHWAYS, SANITARY AFFAIRS

- a. A Motion by Mr. Deklinski, second by Mr. Hawbecker: to accept the bid from Premier Construction for the Redding Park ADA Project of \$62,000.00. The Motion carried. Mr. Deklinski reported there was only one bidder and it was high because prevailing wage must be used due to county funding.**
- b. A Motion by Mr. Deklinski, second by Ms. Stuski: to advertise for bids for the 2018 road project. The Motion carried.**
- c. A Motion by Mr. Deklinski, second by Mrs. Stuart: to accept the Parvin Paving proposal of \$4,530.00 for repairs to Edna Street at Third Street. The Motion carried.**
- d. Mr. Deklinski reported that PAWC will move their water line on Walnut Street at their expense. He will work with UGI to determine the depth of the gas line on Walnut Street and will work with the engineer to come up with a drain that is longer but less deep which may be more cost effective.**

ZONING & CODES ENFORCEMENT

- a. There was no report**

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PUBLIC SAFETY

- a. Mr. Deklinski reported that the old fire house is definitely sold and a closing date is being set. The new building is moving along nicely. The proceeds from the sale will be used to offset the building loan.**
- b. Mr. Deklinski reported that the geese relocation project at Redding Park has started and he passed out flyers to neighbors so that they are aware. The geese are not harmed.**

NEW BUSINESS

- a. Ms. Stuski reported that East Pennsboro was called to a meeting with PENNDOT about the closing of the Erford Road bridge and the meeting was adjourned because Wormleysburg and Camp Hill were not invited to the meeting. It will cause a traffic mess. The Sheetz construction is going on further up the road on Erford Road at the same time.**

Being no further business, at this time, 8:20 p.m. the meeting was adjourned.
